# **Top Large Army Cadet Corps Award**

This year, 2332 RCACC was awarded the prestigious Colonel John H.C Clarry Trophy for Top Large Army Cadet Corps in Ontario. This is an annual award presented by the Army Cadet League. The winner is selected based on a point system which accounts for a number of criteria including interesting and effective training, attendance, team participation, retention rate, and strength –all relative to the size of the Corps community and unit efficiency. We have also been the recipient of the Lord Strathcona Award for Top Large Cadet Corps in the Ottawa/St-Lawrence area for a fifth consecutive year.

# Training

#### Fall FTX

In the fall, 2332 RCACC participated in Operation Premier Craft at Connaught Cadet Training Center (CTC). The cadets worked within their star level to complete challenging training. Gold Star cadets were in charge of sections, made up of cadets from other star levels. This provided an opportunity for them to step up into a leadership role. The Green and Red Star cadets learned how to set up/pack tents, employ stoves and lanterns, and basic navigational skills. Meanwhile, the Silver Stars learned advanced navigational skills and were also given leadership opportunities throughout the weekend. Upon return to the Connaught Camp area, the cadets participated in an orienteering course to finish off the exercise. Overall, OP Premier Craft was a great success and the cadets had an amazing experience.



#### Winter FTX

Operation Return to Jungle Snow provided the cadets with a winter weather experience. The cadets applied their classroom knowledge on winter survival by erecting arctic tents in deep snow, where they later spent the night. They worked together in a team and followed the chain of command. The section commanders ensured their cadets stayed warm, hydrated and on task. In sections, the cadets honed their winter navigational skills, snowshoeing and first aid abilities in a competition style course. Once all the kit was packed up and returned, they enjoyed a nice warm meal in the Connaught mess. Back at the armouries, we recognized the cadets hard work and improvement over the exercise with shout outs and awards.



## **Spring FTX**

2332 RCACC took up their last big challenge of the year in CFB Petawawa for Operation Greener Pastures. The main focus of their training was focused on meeting one of the aims of the cadet program: Canadian Forces (CF) Familiarization Training. The cadets faced many of these challenges through every season Canada has to offer. From rain to overcast to snow to sun, the cadets persevered through it all to grow as individuals, and as a team. They learned about proper radio procedures, environmental stewardship, survival skills and face painting practices.

Due to the hard work of two of 2332's former cadets, Reg Force Cpl Bergeron & Reg Force MCpl Ahronson, we were able to meet many interesting CF members and see valuable, restored relics at the Petawawa Garrison Museum. Overall, the exercise was a grand success due to the attitudes of our cadets and the training provided by our affiliated units. In the process, we were able to strengthen our relationship with our affiliated units. A great exercise to lead into the final weeks of this training year.

# **Competitions Team**

#### Orienteering

Orienteering is a sport involving great cardiovascular endurance and map reading skills. 2332 RCACC has a history of being a strong contender in the Ottawa St Lawrence Area (OSLA). We participated in the orienteering competition where the cadets ran two different races: a team race of 3 people, 2 senior and a junior (score course) as well as running an individual race (line course). This year, we had one male and one female orienteering team and two individual cadets. The competitors ran a new course at Wesley Clover Park where they applied their physical training and knowledge of orienteering theory to accomplish some of their best times! While the teams and individual members did not advance to the Regional this year, they put forward a strong effort, and most of them even headed directly to our Fall FTX that was running concurrently. 
#### **Biathlon**

The biathlon team had their most successful competition season to date. At the area level competition, our two teams took both 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> places and placed first in their individual categories. These results earned all four athletes the opportunity to compete at the Regional Biathlon Competition in Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario. There, MCpl Tibbles and Cpl Morris placed in the top ten, and Sgt Sardelis placed in the top five. MWO Hayden placed 3<sup>rd</sup> to move on and compete at the National Biathlon Competition in Brookvale, Prince Edward Island for the 3<sup>rd</sup> year in a row. After three races at the national level, MWO Hayden finished 5<sup>th</sup> in the individual 7.5 km mass start race, 2<sup>nd</sup> in the 4.5 km patrol race, and 1<sup>st</sup> in the relay race. The biathlon team demonstrated incredible perseverance, teamwork and overall performance.

# Marksmanship

The marksmanship program at 2332 has been highly successful this year! A new approach to team selection was put in place, which has paid off. The main focus was to introduce and develop junior cadets within the marksmanship program. Past members of the competitive teams helped in facilitating the instruction, which developed some basic coaching skills. Focusing on juniors served as a useful method to identify cadets trying out for the competitive team, and ensuring the juniors complete their marksmanship training. In early February, the competitive team was selected based on a series of tryouts in January. The team consisted of: MWO Hayden, Sgt McDonald, Sgt Sardelis, MCpl Awad, and Cpl Hayes. This year, we had one goal in mind: finish in the Top 10 at the Regional Marksmanship Championship. Our practices consisted of highly technical and challenging activities. Many hours have been put in by these amazingly talented individuals and we couldn't be prouder! At the OSLA Marksmanship Competition, 2332 took the Gold medal as a team and qualified for a spot at the Regional Marksmanship Championship. Podium-level performances were also achieved, as Sqt McDonald took Gold and MWO Hayden took Silver in the Open Category. In the Junior category, MCpl Awad also took the Bronze medal. At the Regional Championship, we had a confident approach and managed to shoot very well in our first day of competition by finishing 5th place in the Prone position. The second and final day of competition was very fierce and we managed to beat our personal bests and finished 11th place overall. Great
